


GENERATIONS DEEP

Kaxyala Qvilas: To uplift the laws, customs and traditions of our ancestors and to ensure they affirmed and integrated into all aspects of our Relationships, education, research projects and program delivery.

Aboriginal Peoples' Roles: Kaxyala Qvilas

To attempt **to mitigate** the inter-generational and ongoing impacts of colonial laws, policies And actions on our children, families, communities and cultures.

 Restoring interdependent relationships of accountability and responsibility;


